| Online application After you have been nominated for exchange your home university, you will receive an email was a link to start your online application. | | | |
| | Both exchange and independent ('free-movers'/fee-paying) students need to complete this form in order to be admitted. | | |
| | All applicants must have a valid e-mail address at all times. Without a valid e-mail address we are not able to inform you about important matters, and the student will not be receive a housing offer. | | |
| Entrance requirements | Students must have completed at least 120 ECTS (or the equivalent in local credits) before their semester at the Amsterdam law School. | | |
| Language requirements | All courses in the Amsterdam Exchange programme of the Amsterdam Law School are taught in English. | | |

Proficiency in the English language is therefore a prerequisite. Applicants from non-English speaking countries must present proof of proficiency by providing a copy of either: 1. A TOEFL score of at least 100 iBT; 2. An IELTS score with a minimum score of 7; 3. A Cambridge Proficiency Examination (CPE) (a minimum score of C); 4. If your bachelor's program has been completely taught in English, this is sufficient. 5. An International Baccalaureate or European Baccalaureate Diploma Deadline 1 May: Fall semester. application 15 October: Spring semester.
